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The following bibliography is meant to be an up-date of Huffman's Bibliography.¹ It includes titles relevant to Austroasiatic linguistics; unless stated otherwise, all of them have been sighted by the compiler. The bibliography is arranged by author's name. This is followed by a language-index and a subject-index. The listings that appear in this issue of MKS include only items in Western languages; titles in Thai as well as a list of MA theses in Austroasiatic Linguistics submitted to Mahidol University will be published in the next issue of MKS.

A list of "Textual Sources" follows the indexes to the AA bibliography where references to descriptions of manuscripts and printed books in Austroasiatic languages can be found.

Both bibliographies are intended to be a regular feature in MKS.
